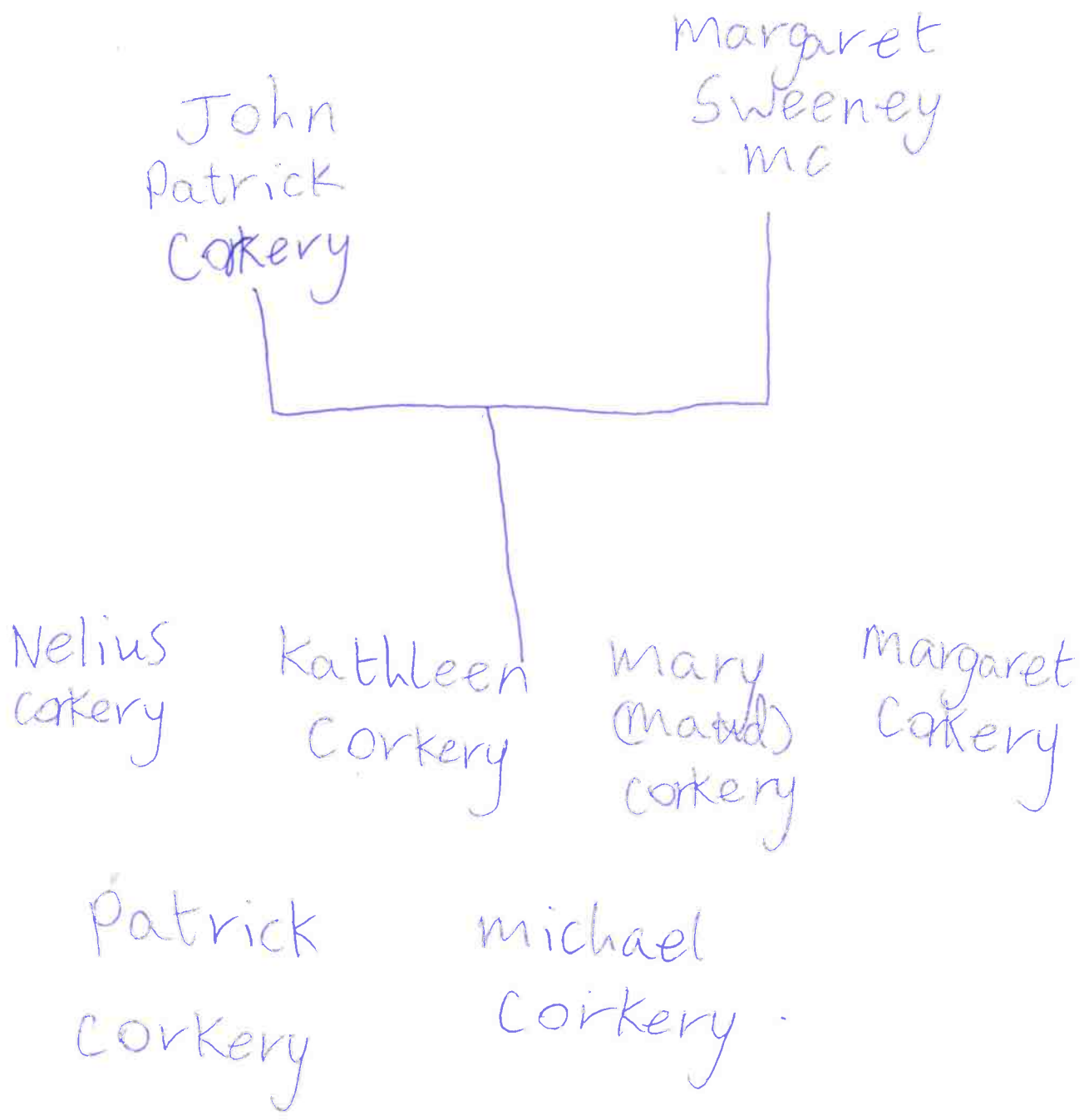
Your Great Great Grandmother's cottage

RACING MOTORISTS PERIL.

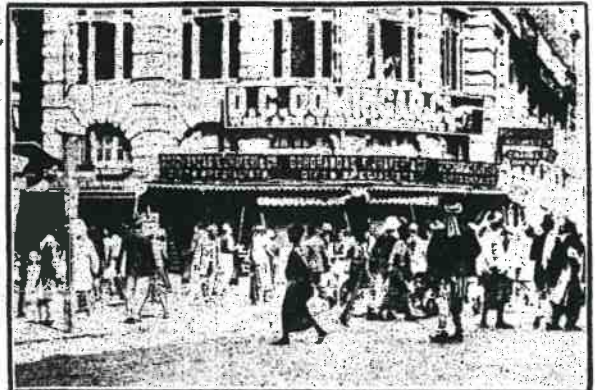

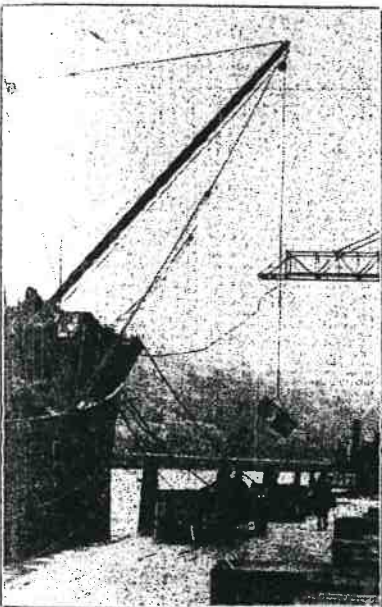


BOMBAY RIOTS.

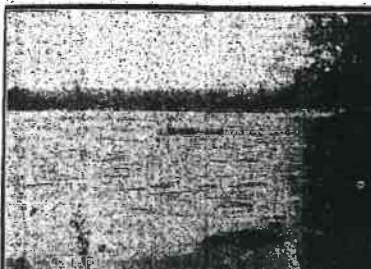

WORLD'S GREATEST NON-STOP FLIGHT.

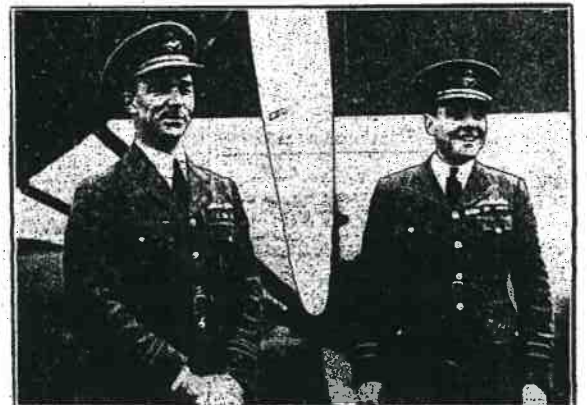
