



The Lyre Company Volunteers



On Easter Sunday morning, 1916 19 members of the Lyre Company Volunteers marched from Lyre to Inchigeelagh. They had one horse and cart rode by Jim Walsh from Knockea. There was a few on bicycles and the rest walked. They left at 8am from Lyre and stopped in Dunmanway on their way. Dunmanway Volunteers joined them on their journey to Inchigeelagh where they were expecting to receive about 20,000 rifles and ammunition. The Volunteers arrived in Inchigeelagh around 3pm but were told that the British Navy had arrested the ship (called the Aud) off the coast of Kerry and the arms were not coming in.
